Lesbia Harford – poet, novelist, law student, articled clerk and famously bisexual – is recognised as a pioneer of women in the legal profession.

Born in Brighton, Melbourne in 1891 Lesbia was a champion of workers' rights, and at the same time a woman of her time. A time of world war, suffrage, the challenging of religious ideals and social upheaval – all of which contributed to the lyric voice discovered in the three notebooks of poems left behind after her early death in 1927.

Although forgotten for decades, Lesbia Harford is now seen as one of the first truly modern, urban figures in Australian poetry.

Clementine Ford is a Melbourne based writer, speaker and feminist thinker.

She is a columnist for Fairfax's *Daily Life* and is a regular contributor to *The Age* and the *Sydney Morning Herald*. Clementine's work has also appeared in *The Guardian, Cosmopolitan, Girlfriend, CLEO, Sunday Life* and *The Big Issue*. She has been a guest on ABC's Q&A and Channel Nine's *Mornings*, and is a frequent contributor to Channel Ten's *The Project*.

In 2012, Clementine was voted one of Australia's most influential female voices by *Daily Life* readers. In 2013 and 2014, those same readers selected her as one of *Daily Life's* 20 Women of the Year.

Clementine's goal is to speak openly and honestly about the state of the world as we live in it. She aspires to give other women the language and confidence to articulate their own experience.
